**PROFESSOR KIMBERLÉ CRENSHAW**, *UCLA School of Law*

A founder of the intellectual movement called Critical Race Theory, Professor Crenshaw teaches Civil Rights, Constitutional Law and topics in critical race studies. Professor Crenshaw's primary scholarly interests center around race and the law and her publications include *Critical Race Theory: The Key Writings that Formed the Movement* and *Words that Wound: Critical Race Theory, Assaultive Speech and the First Amendment*.

**PROFESSOR SOHAIL DAULATZAI**, *UC Irvine - African American/Film and Media Studies*

Professor Daulatzai's published work explores the relationships between Islam, race and popular culture, including his "(Re)Birth of a Nation: Islam, Cultural Politics and the Rhetoric of Empire." He is currently working on two books, one with Michael Eric Dyson entitled *Born To Use Mics* on Nas' 1994 album *Illmatic*, and *Return of the Mecca*, which explores the history of Islam and diasporic Black radicalism through social movements, jazz, sports, literature and hip-hop culture.

**PROFESSOR SAREE MAKDISI**, *UCLA Department of English*

Professor Makdisi is the author of *Romantic Imperialism: Universal Empire and the Culture of Modernity* and *William Blake and the Impossible History of the 1790s*. He has also written a number of articles in publications ranging from *Studies in Romanticism*, *The Cambridge Companion to Blake*, the *Oxford Encyclopedia of British Literature*, *Romanticism, Race and Imperial Culture*, *Palgrave Advances in William Blake Studies*, and the *Cambridge Companion to English Literature, 1740-1830*, and the *London Review of Books*.
